previously enjoyed doing, like dancing, more difficult. She discusses the adaptations that her friends and family made to make sure she could still be included.

-Emma's Story

Emma discusses how she always wanted to be a mum, but didn't know if she was going to be able to as she fell in love with a woman. After she and her wife Ann got married, they started considering options of how to become parents. They decided on adoption and adopted a little girl. She talks about all the things they do together as a family and what she hopes for her daughter as she grows up.


Embracing Difference


Be proud of who you are.

He shares the importance of being proud of who we are and the importance of treating the people around us with respect and kindness.

Bullying and Stereotypes

-Roz's Story

Roz shares the story of how some children were unkind to her at school because she didn't like the things the other girls liked and didn't behave like the other girls. She talks about a girl who stood up for her, who asked her about what she liked and became her friend. She also talks about the importance of being an ally and why we shouldn't stereotype people.



A Normal Family

Everybody's family is different. What's 'normal' to others might seem strange at first, but that's what makes getting to know each other so important.

"A Normal Family" is a part of Diversity Role Models Upstander Animation Series, aiming to empower teachers to foster empathy among their students and find the courage to combat unkindness.

Learning Objectives:

- · Students can identify that no family is 'normal' as all families are different
- Students can name similarities and differences between families
- Students can give at least 2 examples of what they would do to be an upstander if they saw someone being unkind
- Students can explain how it would feel to be treated badly for having a different family








Disability


You don't need sight to see someone for who they are.

Fern discusses what growing up was like for her registered blind. Fern explains how Nancy her guide dog supports her in her day to day life. She talks about things she found difficult but also how she's learned to recognise her strengths and how she can help others.

Themes covered: Disability





Diverse Families

None of my friends had two mums or two dads.

-Jude's Story

Jude talks about her family and who is part of that family. She shares some of the activities they like to do together. She also explains that she and her wife both work for the NHS and how that organisation values diversity within their workforce. Jude also talks about growing up feeling different to others and how finding other people who felt the same as her had a positive impact on her life.

Esther discusses inclusion using her 'everyone is awesome' Lego set. She talks about how all people have many wonderful differences and discusses her own differences; one being that she has a hidden disability and how apacts her life. She also discusses the gender stereotyping she face

that impacts her life. She also discusses the gender stereotyping she faced at school as a girl with short hair who enjoyed maths and science. She discusses how her friends have helped to make her feel included.

She also discusses the difficulties in 'coming out' to her family when she was younger, some bullying incidents she faced and the importance of being a good friend to your 'chosen family'.


Embracing Difference


Be supportive and help people find their superpower.

Claire discusses what she thinks her Mum's superpower is and how important it is that we should all find our own superpowers.

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When I Grow Up

I should have said something. Eddie shouldn't feel embarrassed about his dreams.

"When I Grow Up" is a part of Diversity Role Models Upstander Animation Series, aiming to empower teachers to foster empathy among their students and find the courage to combat unkindness.

Learning Objectives:

- Students can name what they would like to do when they're older and explain why
- Students can explain what a stereotype is and give at least one example of a stereotype
- Students can analyse the importance of challenging stereotypes and supporting others to be themselves
- Students can argue why stereotypes can be harmful





Embracing Difference and Adoption/Fostering

Learn about others and what makes them special.

-Charlie's Story

Charlie talks about her foster family and the challenges of moving home to live with a new family. She explains her difficulties in trying to fit in and not being able to accept or embrace her differences or the differences in others. Charlie discusses what helped her to embrace her true self and how this has helped her in her adult life.

Carole experienced bullying for her skin colour, weight, and being from a single-parent household. She talks about the bullying she experienced, the impact it had on her, and the importance of telling an adult about bullying.

Themes: Bullying, racism, wellbeing

The Impact of Bullying

It's important to be kind and support your friends.

-Jamie's Story

Jamie shares his story about not fitting in at school as he grew up. He talks about how as he got older his interests changed and no longer wanted to play the 'stereotypical boy things' and instead wanted to play 'stereotypical girl things'. He talks about how some children in his school started to bully him for this difference. He also talks about how no one stood up for him and the importance of being kind and showing support for your friends.

-Nimerta's Story

Nimerta experienced racist stereotypes and homophobic language at school. She talks about finding a community, standing up for each other, and embracing your own differences and identity.

Themes: Bullying, racism, allyship, LGBTQ+ identities

Gender Equality and Gender Stereotypes



-Justin's Story

Justin shares his experience of attending an all-boys school and how seeing all the other boys liking similar things made him feel different. He describes how he felt he

had to act in a certain way in order to fit in, even though this didn't make him feel happy. Justin explains how when he grew up he found people that were supportive of him not behaving like 'a typical boy'. This meant that he could begin to explore who he was. Some of the things that made him happy were dressing how he wanted, cutting his hair how he liked and realising that he liked boys.


Gender Diversity


All of us have a lot of differences.

Robert knew he was transgender from an early age, but didn't tell anyone because he didn't know there was a word for how he felt. Other children made him feel bad for being different, but he realised that difference is a good thing and learned to be proud of who he is.

-Smudge's Story

Alastair (who's nickname is Smudge) talks about the diversity within his family and about the different members of his extended family. He also talks about the difficulty of 'when he was younger his identity and the hamanhabia.

It was difficult to leave my mum and siblings.

-Abdi's Story

Abdi talks about growing up in Somalia then having to leave as a refugee because of war. He moved to The Netherlands, then to the UK and he speaks about having a language barrier and having to find other ways to fit in. Abdi

wanted a feeling of belonging and to feel like a normal teenager, and he encourages us to help people that want that feeling of belonging too.

LGBTQ+ History and Rights

I thought I would never be able to get married.

-Simon's Story

Simon talks about how he realised he was gay in Sixth Form but he didn't want to admit this to himself or others. He was scared to come out and this impacted his

relationships. Simon recalls how he felt awkward at weddings because he thought that, as a gay man, he could never marry. He talks about how he met his partner in a cafe and he gave him the confidence to come out. In time, the law changed and Simon was able to marry his partner.

-Paul's Story

Paul shares his story about his civil partner, their daughter and their grandchildren. He shares how he felt different from a young age and when he was in high school he realised he was gay and how he later came out to his friend Sheena. Paul is a vicar in

the Church of England and talks about the importance of being kind and having courage.

LGBTQ+ History and Rights

I knew I was different, but I didn't know why.

-Tilla's Story

Tilla talks about some of the challenges she faced growing up and how she struggled to make friends and be herself. She ended up joining the Navy and when her friend in the Navy came out to her, she came out to the friend too. It was illegal to be gay in the Navy at the time and she lost her job. She encourages people to be themselves and share this with a trusted person.

Themes: LGBTQ+ identities, discrimination in the armed force

Creating an Inclusive School

Each one of us matters for who we are.

-Steve's Story

Steve is the founder of a charity called 'Oasis'. He talks about the aims of Oasis, which include creating a safe space in schools where children feel able to ask questions and don't pick on other people for being different from them (different skin colour, height, sexuality etc). He is also a Reverend and shares how proud he was to have officiated the marriage of two of his friends Ben and Jacob.

Themes: LGBTQ+ identities, same-sex marriage, diversity, and the importance of being inclusive.

- Students can define the term 'transgender'
- Students can provide at least one way they could be an upstander to the LGBTQ+ community
- Students can analyse the importance of challenging stereotypes and give at least one example of a stereotype and how to challenge them

Building Inclusion Through Play

Minifig Careers Fair

About this activity:

In this Learning Through Play Activity pupils will make a minifigure that represent a certain job role. Once they have completed the activity, there is an opportunity to discuss any stereotypes present, any builds that break stereotypes, and the dangers of stereotyping and making assumptions. Follow-up activities allow pupils to take the learning from this activity to design their own minifigure that breaks stereotypes linked to job roles, families and hobbies.

Themes: assumptions, stereotypes, respecting difference

The classroom video guides pupils through our minifigure activity themed around stereotyping linked to job roles. Pause the video at any point to clarify any instructions.



Building Inclusion Through Play

Back to Back

About this activity:

In this Learning Through Play Activity pupils will stand back to back and try to copy the design of their partner's block of six bricks, following verbal instructions only.

The activity demonstrates the challenges we can have in making accurate representations when we have limited information. It shines a light on how easy it is to make assumptions and can open up conversations around the pitfalls of stereotypical thinking.

Themes: assumptions, stereotypes, communication

The classroom video guides pupils through our Back to Back activity themed around assumptions, stereotypes and communication. Pause the video at any point to clarify any instructions.


